President's Report by Wanda Waltman

Now is the time, as school begins to wind down, to look back on this last school year and evaluate how the year went. Were the goals achieved, were the programs and activities successful and what might need to be changed to make the next school year an even better one? A good rule of thumb to follow is the 3:1 ratio which says that for every *one* fundraising event, there should be *three* events that do not involve fundraising (building community spirit within the school, parent education, advocacy, etc).

The elections for the officers for the 2011-2012 school year should be done by now and the board elect busy formulating their plans for the upcoming school year. It is very important that the List of Officers from each unit (school) for this next school year be sent to their council and the councils in turn will send this information, along with their own list of officers, to 32nd District. The information from each council needs to be sent to 32nd District by May 15th so councils will need the information from their schools before that date. The councils should send the List of Officers to both the 32nd District President and the VP for Communications. The officer contact information is needed to insure that the new officers receive, in a timely manner, the vital information that is sent over the summer from State PTA. Another important piece of information is the Annual Report which lists the number of volunteer hours accumulated over the school year by each school, council and district and gives a brief overview of the activities for the year. This form is in the Toolkit and is due to the councils by the beginning

of May so that the councils have the forms to 32nd District by May 15th. Volunteerism is the heart and soul of PTA and the thousands of volunteer hours accumulated across the state make it possible for PTA to do its work when advocating for all children.

On June 25th the 32nd District will present its annual Leadership Academy for officer training at the Willow Creek Center here in Concord. It is an opportunity for all the incoming officers for this next school year to attend a variety of workshops on PTA basics, electronic communications, fundraising and programs such as Reflections. In addition, there will be workshops specifically for presidents and financial officers. Well trained officers are a huge factor in the success of a PTA and I would strongly urge all units and councils to plan on attending the Leadership Academy.

I want to thank you all again for everything that you do for the children in our schools and community. As advocates for children, you have devoted many hours to making the programs at your units and councils successful ones and your volunteerism is what gives PTA the powerful voice it needs to speak for all children. I also want to thank the out going 32nd District Executive board for their time, energy and efforts in supporting our councils and units. Your leadership has been a key factor in guiding and mentoring all our councils and units in their efforts in advocating for children. Congratulations and thank you to the incoming Executive Board for 2011-2013. ■

A Message from Our County Superintendent of Schools

Joseph A. Ovick, Ed.D.



Our children are on a collision course with the future, and in large part this is due to the reduction of funding for K-12 education.

Although public education represents 40% of the state budget, K-12 education has endured 60% of the budget reductions over the last three years in California. What we are faced with today are fewer afterschool opportunities for our children, a shorter school year, and larger class sizes. Also, summer school is now primarily for remedial education; in the past, children could take an entire array of classes for academic enrichment. California has the largest class sizes in the nation. We have lost counselors, school librarians, and less personal attention provided to our children because of our large class sizes and lack of support staff.

Music and the arts have all slipped away because of a lack of funding. We have the fewest administrators per student of all 50 states. A new UCLA report shows the extent of the budget cuts on our children. We are providing fewer learning opportunities, and we have intensified the inequality between schools serving low- and high-income communities.

We know that the future economy will be a knowledge-based economy, and it is embarrassing to realize we are providing limited resources to prepare our children for the new economy that will also be global in nature.

Wake up, Californians! Most societies first protect, shelter, and nourish the well-being of their children. We appear to have forgotten that primary responsibility as responsible adults. ■

Membership News

We now use the California State PTA membership year- July 1-June 30 for all rewards, recognitions and membership reporting. In the past, we had used National PTA's membership year - April 1- March 31 for many calculations and awards. This resulted in a lot of confusion, especially with per capita paid to state between March 31 and June 30th. Units that meet the annual challenge and those that reached 100% of membership will still be acknowledged at convention, but the actual certificates will be sent after June 30th. However, units still need to submit at least 15 per capita (dues) and insurance through channels by March 31st to remain as PTAs. That has not changed.

New for 2011-2012: Early Bird and Chairman's Club awards have been replaced with **Ready, Set...Remit!** Units must submit 30 memberships to be received in the state office by October 30 to be eligible for this award. In addition, those units who apply for Spotlight awards must also meet the new criteria of Ready, Set.. Remit!

Tax Extensions Needed to Protect Our Schools

As we reported in our last issue, PTA supports the Governor's budget proposal containing a combination of cuts and revenue increases. The proposal strives to avoid the gimmicks, borrowing and unrealistic assumptions that have plagued budgets over the past many years. This proposal also seeks to somewhat protect education funding, which has taken the largest hit over the past three years of cuts (\$18 billion in cuts, or \$1,900 per student).

The important caveat is that extensions of taxes raised two years ago (and set to expire this year) must be approved by the legislature. We supported the legislature placing an initiative on the June ballot to "let the people decide". However, disappointingly, the legislature could not come to the 2/3-majority agreement to support such a measure in the time needed. At this point, the legislature has already made over \$11.5 billion in cuts, many of which affect services that are vital to so many parents and families, including higher education, child care, Healthy Families, public libraries, CalWORKs and foster care. Much of the \$12.5 billion in revenue extensions are allocated for education funding.

PTA is advocating for the legislature to extend the temporary revenues legislatively. The revenue extensions are needed to keep even deeper cuts from the classroom. After three years of catastrophic cuts to education, school funding is "falling off a cliff." Should the revenue extensions not be granted, the possibilities look grave. We are hearing that **the school year could be shortened by six weeks next year, and many school districts could face bankruptcy and even closure. Our children already struggle with overcrowded classrooms, outdated instructional materials and less time (e.g. furlough days) to learn essential curriculum.** Citizen demands for an educated workforce cannot be met with continuing diminishment of resources to its students.

PTA Takes Positions on Legislation

Did you know that California State PTA takes positions on ballot measures and bills in the legislature? You can find positions at www.capta.org. Here are some key positions to be aware of:

- **Ballot Measure (June election): California Cancer Research Act (Support)** increases tax on cigarettes by \$1.00 per pack for use in smoking prevention and treatment
- **AB 18 (Brownley) – Support** - to produce a comprehensive plan for finance reform to support pupil achievement. PTA believes that we must work toward a long-term solution for adequate and stable education funding.
- **SCA 5 (Simitian) – Support** - a bill to lower the threshold for local school parcel taxes from the current two-thirds vote to a super majority of 55 percent, to allow local communities the option of passing local funding measures.
- We will continue to raise our voice on behalf of the state's more than 9 million children.

What Else Can PTAs do?

- **Educate** your members and the public about budget concerns. District Legislation Committee members are available to speak on the subject at your meetings. Contact nmvandell@comcast.net to arrange a speaker.
- **Run a voter registration drive.** In many of our communities, voter turnout in November's election was lower than average. Does your high school have a program for sending voter registration forms to students as they turn 18? Visit the 32nd District website for detailed information on how to hold such a drive.
- **Establish a Legislative Advocacy chairman or vice president position in your PTA unit.** We can provide support and training.
- **Join our 32nd District PTA legislative advocacy e-mail list** for regular updates by contacting nmvandell@comcast.net.
- **Join our 32nd District PTA legislative advocacy committee.** Any PTA member in Contra Costa County is welcome. Our next meeting is Friday, May 13, at 11:30 a.m. at the Contra Costa County Office of Education in Pleasant Hill.

Reminder letters were mailed to all PTAs that need to update their bylaws. To assure the new bylaws can be approved by the state parliamentarian and subsequently adopted by the PTA before the end of the term, please submit revised bylaws to reach me no later than six weeks prior to the association's last meeting this spring or by May 5, 2011, whichever is earlier. Bylaws may continue to be submitted after this date; however, there is no guarantee they will be approved and returned in time for your association to adopt them. ***Congratulations to Martinez Council of PTAs and San Ramon Valley Council of PTAs for having up-to-date bylaws for all of their units!***

New from the California Attorney General Registrar of Charitable Trusts – all PTAs must register for a Charitable Trust (CT) number by December 2012. To complete the registration, each PTA must provide a copy of its current bylaws. The Registrar will not accept outdated bylaws. PTA policy requires that bylaws be approved by the state parliamentarian at least every three years. To avoid a long wait for your PTA's CT number at the end of next year, it's important to get started now and make sure the PTA's bylaws are up-to-date.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Following **basic parliamentary procedure** at PTA meetings provides for order, promptness and fair and impartial treatment for all.
- The parliamentary authority for PTA is Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised.
- Bylaws provide the basic framework for the PTA purposes and the governing structure.
- Bylaws may never be suspended.
- Bylaws should be reviewed annually to determine if any changes are needed. Follow the California State PTA procedures to amend bylaws.
- Standing rules provide detail regarding procedures for the PTA.
- A standing rule may be amended at any association meeting by a majority vote. (A two-thirds vote is required if no previous notice has been given.)
- Each board member should have a copy of the bylaws. At the beginning of a new term of office, the bylaws should be reviewed by the entire board.
- Every board member needs to know and understand the bylaws – “the rules of the game.”
- A copy of the bylaws must be provided to any member upon request.
- The executive board should be trained in parliamentary procedure in order to model it for the membership.
- The parliamentarian advises the president who rules on points of order and procedural questions.
- A motion chart may be laminated and placed between the president and the parliamentarian for easy reference at meetings.
- Many district PTAs keep a supply of standard Bylaws for Local PTA/PTSAs and Council Bylaws available for purchase.
- Units should provide the council and district PTA with a copy of their bylaws.
- A PTA position may be filled by only one person.
- One position equals one vote.

- Minutes should contain records of all actions taken by the group, including the exact wording of every motion, the maker of the motion and the actions taken on that motion.
 - The secretary or chair should request that the motion be in writing if the motion is long or involved.
 - Only one action may be considered at a time.
 - Any action (spending money, adopting programs, etc.) to be taken requires a motion.
 - When several PTA members wish to speak to the same issue during a meeting, the parliamentarian may assist the president by noting the names of those wishing to speak and the order in which they should be called.
 - Only members of the group that is meeting have the right to attend unless the group grants permission for guests to attend. However, the right to vote cannot be granted to a guest.
 - PTA bylaws define each separate meeting group – committee, executive board and association – and assign separate responsibilities and authority to each group.
 - A special meeting may be called to consider one or more items of business requiring urgent action before the next regular meeting.
 - Voice vote is the regular method of voting on motions requiring a majority vote. If the chair believes the vote will be close, he may call for the vote by a show of hands.
 - A rising vote is the regular method of voting on motions requiring a two-thirds vote. It is also used to verify an inconclusive voice vote.
 - The chair may order a “rising count” or “count of the house” to verify an inconclusive voice vote.
 - A two-thirds vote is required to change any action previously adopted by the group, such as bylaws or the budget.
 - A standing rule may be adopted to limit the length of time for any motion and to limit the number of speakers on each side of the issue and the time to be allotted for each speaker.
 - Voting by proxy is prohibited.
 - The president protects the impartiality of the chair by exercising the right to vote (or by abstaining) only when the vote will affect the outcome, i.e., to break a tie vote, or when the vote is by ballot.
 - Members must be given written notice of all association meetings, along with an agenda that includes all action items to be considered, at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting.
 - Only members are legally qualified to make motions, discuss and vote. ■

Historian's Report

Let's add up those volunteer hours!

The California State PTA requires that each unit complete and file an Annual Historian Report, which includes the total number of volunteer hours. The information from these reports will be used by the California State PTA for possible review or revisions of programs, publications, projects, and leadership training. Additionally, the total number of volunteer hours are used to raise awareness of legislators, school and community personnel, and others, of the needs of children.

Hours to be counted should include:

- Attendance at meetings, workshops, and other functions where you represent PTA
- Convention attendance
- Travel time spent to and from PTA activities
- Telephone time regarding PTA business
- Time spent writing PTA agendas, minutes, correspondence, reports, newsletter articles and tallying hours
- Time spent shopping, preparing and creating hospitality amenities for PTA functions
- Time spent participating in school and community service or activities benefiting children
- Advocacy Day in Sacramento
- Registration
- PTA and other school fundraisers
- Classroom hours

All Presidents received an Unit Annual Report form in the PTA toolkit. The President and Historian should work together to complete this form and return it to the **Council Historian by the May 1st deadline**. For more information, go to the California State PTA website at:

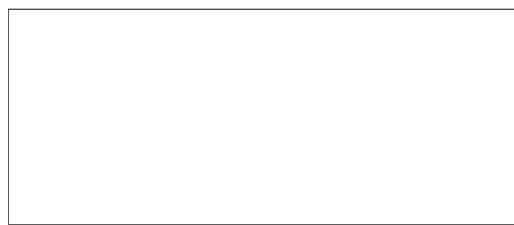
